The first tube was the focus of a presentation at our Wombeyan Conference and those at the New Zealand Conference last year will remember Andy's slide show of Yongcheondonggul.


This lava tube has artefacts left by people who used the cave prior to its entrance(s?) closing with sand infill and a lake that may connect to the sea. Both are very special places and these facts will greatly enhance the chance of World Heritage inscription. Security is second to none, but I sincerely hope that there is much careful thought

to their long-term management, because both are incredibly fragile.

Cathie Plowman recently held the first of her workshops at Naracoorte to commence the building of a cave guides resource kit. It was a successful workshop with Tantanoola and Princess Margaret Rose Caves' guides also participating. Naracoorte staff reported it was the best interpretation workshop they had attended. I was embarrassed by one point Cathie raised; we provide plenty of training opportunities and have a reasonable library of resources at Naracoorte. However, we have embarrassingly few books on interpretation. I would suggest we might not be alone. I also encourage other sites that have the opportunity to participate in a workshop with Cathie and to make the most of it.

As reported by Andy Spate elsewhere in this Journal, ACKMA was unsuccessful at the recent ISCA Congress in Bermuda in obtaining the 2010 Congress for Waitomo. On behalf of ACKMA, I thank Andy Spate, Greg Martin, Peter Chandler and various Waitomo members for their efforts in pulling together the submission and Andy for presenting it in Bermuda.

Visitation should be limited, as evidenced by the track that passes between these very long straws.
